Andrzej Frycz Modrzewski Kraków University (AFMKU) is a non-public university based in the south of Poland, with nearly 9,000 students, including over 2,000 international students from 55 countries across all continents.

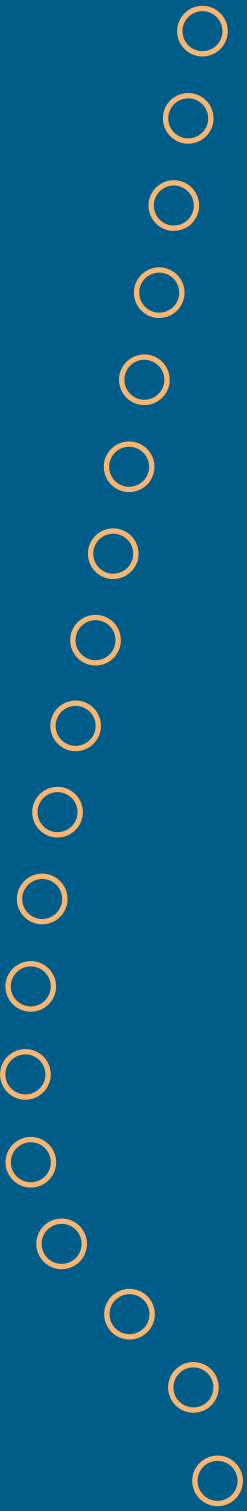
The University offers a wide range of bachelor's and master's degree programmes in both Polish and English, including fields such as medicine, law, social sciences, film and TV production, architecture, management, international relations, nursing, physiotherapy, psychology, and many others. The programmes are designed to meet the needs of a rapidly changing labour market by combining academic theory with practical experience.

AFMKU is committed to developing international cooperation, enhancing the quality of education, and supporting student mobility and international engagement.

The University actively participates in the Erasmus+ Programme, partnering with over 70 universities in 19 countries.

The campus is located in the vibrant and fast-developing Zabłocie district. It is well connected to the rest of Kraków — just 10 minutes by public transport to the Main Railway Station, 15 minutes to the Market Square, and 15 minutes to the historic Kazimierz district.

The patron of the University- Andrzej Frycz Modrzewski (1503–1572) was a prominent Polish Renaissance thinker and writer, often referred to as “the father of Polish humanism.” He advocated for social justice, equality before the law, and reforms in both the Church and the State. In his most famous work, *De Republica emendanda*, he emphasized the importance of education for all, freedom of speech, and peace among nations. His progressive ideas were far ahead of his time and influenced future generations of thinkers.

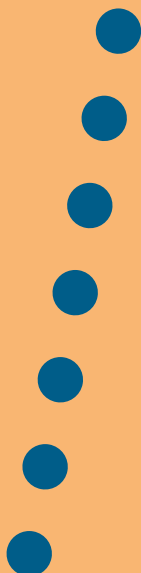

How to Apply

To apply to our University, your home university must nominate you by e-mail. The nomination should include your first name, surname, email address, field of study, study cycle (e.g. Bachelor's, Master's). Once nominated, you will receive an email with registration instructions and a list of required documents.

Required Documents:

- Application form
- Language certificate confirming English proficiency at B2 level
- Online Learning Agreement (OLA)

Application deadlines

For winter semester: 30 June

For spring semester: 30 November

As soon as your documents are verified and approved by the relevant Erasmus+ Coordinator, you will receive a **Letter of Acceptance**, officially confirming your admission.

Student ID Card

Erasmus+ students are eligible to apply for a student ID card. As part of the application process, you will need to submit a passport-style photo, complete the application form, pay the ID card fee. The student ID card serves as an official university identification. It provides access to university systems, the library, and various student discounts – for example, on public transport.



Courses

As an Erasmus+ student, you can choose from a wide range of courses offered at our University. If you need assistance with selecting courses, or have questions about your study programme, please contact your **Faculty Coordinator**. This is an academic staff member who will support you in choosing the right courses and must **approve your Learning Agreement before your mobility period begins**.

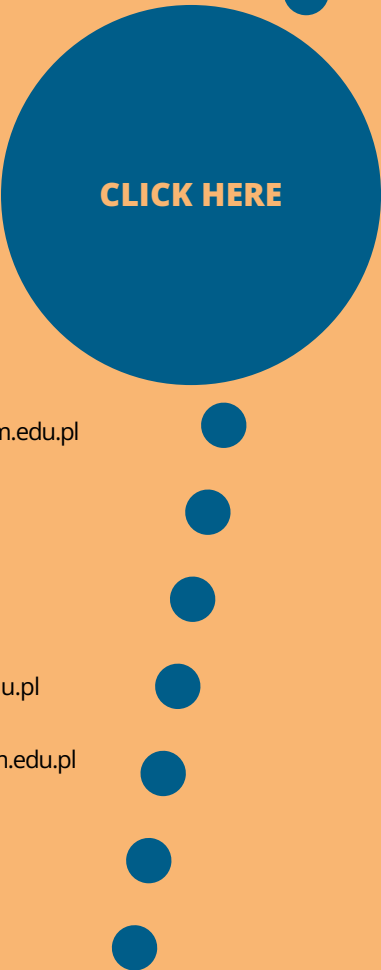

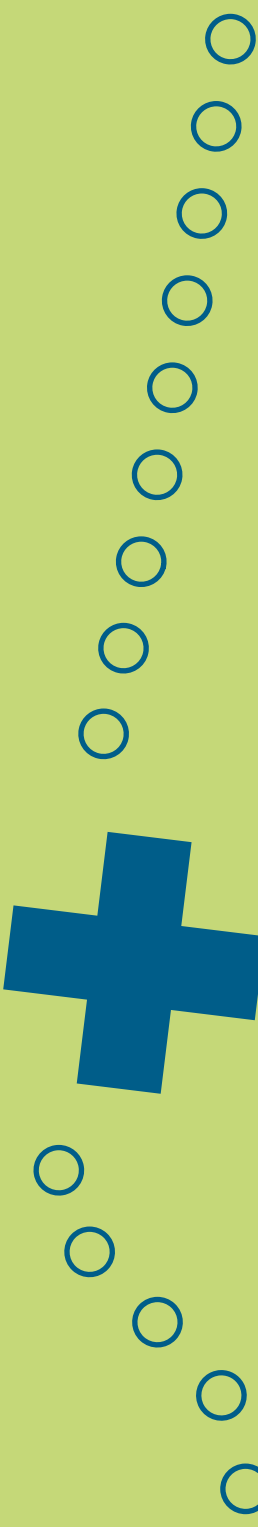

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Accommodation

The University does not have its own dormitories. However, Erasmus+ students arriving at the University can stay at the on-campus guest house „uFrycza”, fully adapted for people with disabilities. It offers comfortable and secure accommodation in a convenient location perfect for exploring the city's cultural and social life.

There are comfortable private student residences located nearby. Basecamp is just a 3-minute walk from the campus, and Student Depot is only one tram stop away. Many international students coming to Kraków also choose to rent private apartments, or shared flats in the city.

Health Insurance

- All Erasmus+ students should have valid health insurance covering emergency and full medical treatment for the entire stay in Poland.
- EU citizens should bring a valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC).
- Non-EU citizens must purchase private health insurance before arrival.
- Make sure you have valid health insurance before your departure.
- For details, visit the website of the Polish Consular Office in your country.

Visa

EU/EEA Citizens

Citizens of the European Union (EU) and European Economic Area (EEA) do not need a visa to enter Poland. They can stay in Poland for up to 90 days with a valid travel document or another official ID confirming their identity and citizenship.

Non-EU Citizens

Non-EU students must apply for a visa before arriving in Poland. To apply for a student visa, you may need an Acceptance Letter from Andrzej Frycz Modrzewski Krakow University, which can be issued once all required application documents have been submitted.

Please note visa requirements may vary depending on your country of residence, the Acceptance Letter may not be sufficient to obtain a visa in some cases.

It is strongly recommend to check the visa regulations on the official website of the Polish embassy, or consulate in your country, or on the website of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Poland:

Buddy System

Incoming Erasmus+ students can benefit from the Buddy System, a student-led initiative designed to help international students adapt to life in Kraków and at the university.

As part of the **Buddy System**, each incoming student is matched with a local student – called a **“buddy”** – who serves as a guide and point of contact. Your buddy can assist you with practical matters such as finding your way around the city and campus, registering at the university, understanding your class schedule, dealing with everyday tasks (e.g. shopping, transportation, opening a bank account), or introducing you to student life and local culture.

The Buddy System is a great way to meet new people, make friends, and feel more comfortable during your stay.

What might be useful

Transportation

Kraków Airport (Balice)

is located 11 km from the city center. It is easy to get there by train directly from Kraków Główny Railway Station located in the city center, next to Galeria Krakowska, by bus, or by taxi.

MDA (Małopolski Dworzec Autobusowy)

MDA Bus Station in Kraków is located right next to the Kraków Główny Railway Station and operates domestic and international connections (e.g. Flixbus).

Cars

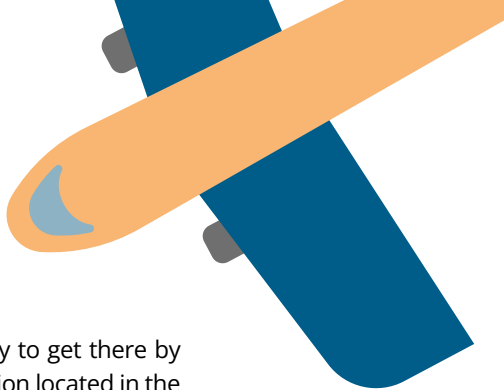
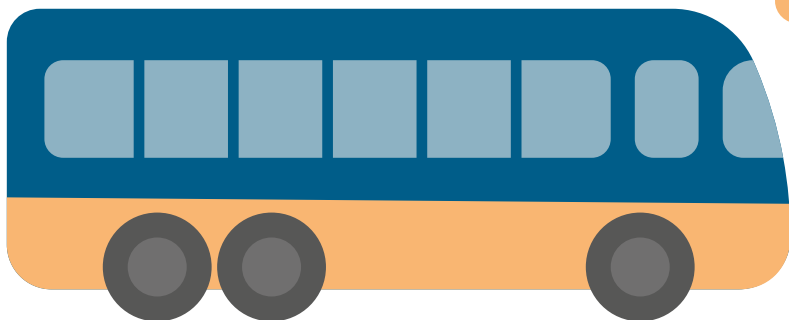
There are several paid parking zones in Kraków. The fee depends on the zone. Payments are made at parking meters.

Public transport

The best way to get around Kraków is by tram, or by bus. Another option is the Fast Urban Railway known as SKA - Szybka Kolej Aglomeracyjna.

Public Transport Tickets in Kraków

You can buy tickets via the Jakdojade app, or ticket machines at tram/bus stops.





Currency in Poland

The official currency in Poland is the Polish złoty (PLN). Euros are not widely accepted, so make sure to use, or exchange local currency.

You can withdraw cash from ATMs, deposit money using cash deposit machines, or manage your funds through banking apps.

- **November 11:** Independence Day
- **December 24:** Christmas Eve
- **December 25-27:** Christmas Day and St. Stephen's Day (first and second days of celebration)
- **January 6:** Epiphany

- **Corpus Christi:** the date changes annually, on Thursday after Pentecost (May or June)
- **May 1:** Labour Day
- **May 2:** The Day of the Polish Flag and the Day of Polonia
- **May 3:** The Constitution Day
- **August 15:** The Assumption of Mary

Getting a Polish SIM card

Having a Polish phone number will make your stay much easier – you'll need it for opening a bank account or registering for some services. SIM cards are available at airports, shopping malls, convenience stores, and official operator shops. You will need your passport, or your national ID (you must register your SIM card when purchasing it).

Electricity and plugs

In Poland, the standard voltage is 230 V, and the frequency is 50 Hz. Power plugs and sockets are of type E, which have two round pins. Travelers from countries with different plug types may need an adapter.

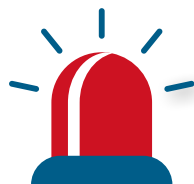
Respecting the Rules in Poland

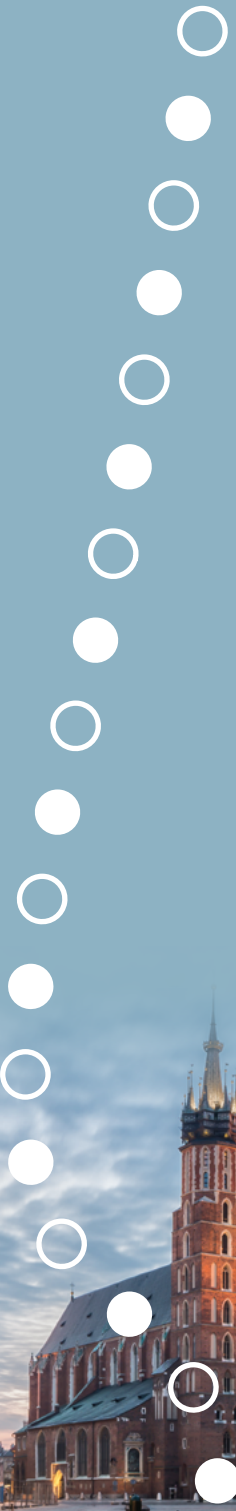
Following local rules will help make your stay in Poland safe and enjoyable. Here are some important regulations to keep in mind:

- Quiet hours: from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
- Recycling is mandatory – sort your waste accordingly
- Most shops are closed on Sundays (no shopping on non-trade Sundays)
- Do not cross the street on a red light
- Do not use your phone while crossing the street
- Drinking alcohol in public places is prohibited
- You cannot buy alcohol after 10:00 p.m.
- Using a phone while driving is not allowed

Bike paths: Kraków offers many cycling paths. One of the most popular is the enjoyable path to Tyniec, the oldest existing monastery in Poland. Bikes and scooters can be rented using popular apps.



What to see outside of Kraków?

Wieliczka Salt Mine

Dating back to the 13th century, this is one of the largest salt mines in Europe and is listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Discover underground chambers, chapels carved out of salt, and fascinating medieval history.

Auschwitz-Birkenau Museum

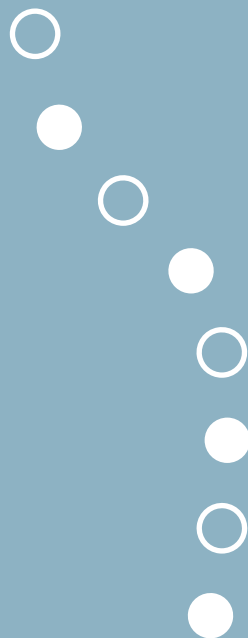
The former German Nazi concentration and extermination camp – one of the world's most significant memorial sites. A visit here is a deeply moving lesson in history and human dignity.

The Tatra Mountains and Zakopane

The Tatras are Poland's highest mountain range, perfect for hiking, skiing, and connecting with nature. At their base lies Zakopane – a charming town known for its wooden highlander architecture, regional cuisine, and unique atmosphere. Popular hiking destinations include Morskie Oko Lake (Sea Eye), Valley of Five Lakes, Chochołowska Valley, and Kościeliska Valley.

Energylandia – Amusement Park

The largest amusement park in Poland, located in Zator (around 1 hour-drive from Kraków). It features dozens of roller coasters, themed zones, water attractions, and live shows.



Be careful when you see the dragon...

Some legends and stories related to Kraków

In Poland, legends are an important part of culture – they teach values, present heroes, and explain the origins of places and customs. Kraków, being one of the oldest cities in Poland, has an especially rich world of legends.

The Legend of the Wawel Dragon

Long ago, a fearsome dragon lived beneath Wawel Hill. It devoured animals and kidnapped people, and no one could defeat it – until a young shoemaker named Dratewka came up with a clever idea. He stuffed a sheep with sulfur and tricked the dragon into eating it. After the feast, the dragon became so thirsty that it drank the entire Vistula River... until it burst! Today, in memory of this story, you can see a dragon statue under Wawel Castle that actually breathes fire.



The Legend of the St. Mary's Trumpet Call (Hejnał)

Every hour, a bugle call is played from the tower of St. Mary's Basilica. But... the melody suddenly breaks off. Why? According to legend, during the Middle Ages, a trumpeter sounded the alarm to warn Kraków's residents of an incoming Tatar invasion. Sadly, while playing, he was struck by an arrow. Since then, the melody has always ended in the same spot – exactly where the trumpeter was interrupted.



Polish your Polish

Polish belongs to the Slavic language group, which means that it may be somewhat similar to Czech, Slovak, or Ukrainian—but it has its own unique character and melody. Polish is known as one of the more difficult languages to learn—it has complicated grammar, seven cases, and lots of exceptions. But don't worry! In everyday life, a basic knowledge is enough, and most Poles greatly appreciate any attempt to speak their language – even if you make mistakes.

Polish cuisine has a rich history shaped over centuries, influenced by Slavic, Jewish, Austrian, and Eastern European traditions. As a result, Polish dishes are diverse, aromatic, and often.... very filling!

While pierogi are world-famous, Polish cuisine also offers a wide variety of soups, meat dishes, and delicious cakes and desserts.

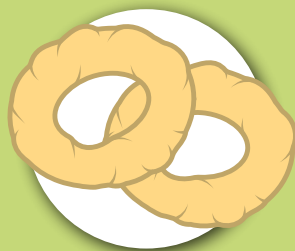


Polish name	English name	What is it?
Rosół	Chicken broth	Clear chicken soup with noodles – a traditional Sunday lunch starter.
Barszcz	Beetroot soup	A red soup made from beets, often served with small dumplings (uszka).
Żurek	Sour rye soup	A sour, creamy soup made with fermented rye flour, served with egg and sausage.
Pierogi	Dumplings	Dough parcels filled with meat, cheese, potatoes, mushrooms, or fruit.
Kotlet schabowy	Breaded pork cutlet	Similar to schnitzel – a pork chop coated in breadcrumbs and fried.
Bigos	Hunter's stew	Stewed sauerkraut with various meats and mushrooms – very rich and hearty.
Sernik	Cheesecake	Baked cheesecake made with a special Polish cheese (twaróg).
Szarlotka	Apple pie	Polish-style apple pie with cinnamon – often served warm.
Makowiec	Poppy seed roll	Rolled cake filled with sweet poppy seed paste – popular for holidays.
Pączki	Polish doughnuts	Deep-fried doughnuts with jam or other sweet fillings, covered in sugar.

Kraków is full of unique local tastes and sweet surprises. Here are a few must-try treats you shouldn't miss during your stay:

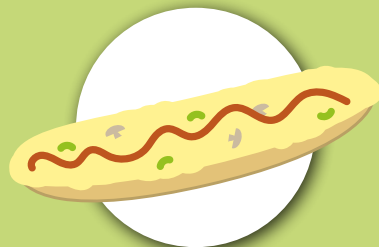
Obwarzanek krakowski (Kraków-style bagel)

A round twisted bread with a crispy crust and soft inside – sprinkled with poppy seeds, sesame, or salt. It's a symbol of Kraków and a popular street snack. You'll find them at every corner in little blue carts! Fun fact: Obwarzanek has been baked in Kraków since the 14th century!



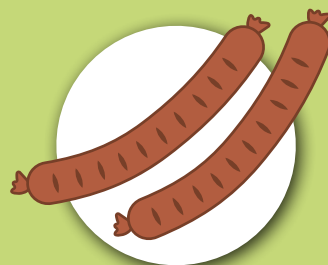
Zapiekanka

Zapiekanka is a toasted open-face sandwich made of a sliced baguette, or other long roll of bread, topped with sautéed white mushrooms, cheese and sometimes other ingredients such as ham. Served hot with ketchup. Some zapiekanka stands even attained cult following, such as those located in Plac Nowy (New Square) in the Kazimierz district of Kraków.



Kiełbaska z Nyski

"Kiełbaska z Nyski" ("Sausage from Nyska") is an iconic street food spot in Kraków. Since the 1990s, a historic blue Nysa van has been serving grilled sausages with a bun and mustard near the Hala Targowa market hall. This place has become a legendary late-night food stop in Kraków. The sausages are grilled over an open flame, giving them a unique taste and aroma.
